## ADDITIONAL TREES- OPTION 1

This diagram illustrates locations for the 9 additional trees missing from the original planning approved quantity. It fills the gaps in the line of Silver Birch on Pembury Road, augments the communal garden with a pair of Amelanchier, enriches the planted entrance area with three additional trees, and extends the line of London Planes along Dalston Lane.

These locations have been reviewed against the As Built utility drawings.



### LEGEND

- **2 Betula jacquemontii**  
Himalayan Birch  
Size: 18-20cm girth, 2m clear stem, semi-mature, typically 3.5m tall x 2m wide at planting
- **2 Platanus acerifolia**  
London Plane  
Size: 30-35cm girth, 2m clear stem, semi-mature, typically 7-9m tall x 2-3m wide at planting
- **MS**  
**2 Betula jacquemontii**  
Himalayan Birch  
Size: multi stem, semi-mature, 2.5-3.0m tall x 2m wide at planting
- **1 Carpinus betulus**  
Hornbeam  
Size: 25-30cm girth, 2m clear stem, semi-mature, typically 4-5m tall x 2.5m wide at planting
- **2 Amelanchier lamarkii**  
Juneberry  
Size: multi stem, semi-mature, 2.5-3.0m tall x 2m wide at planting
- **Proposed additional planting beds**

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## OPTION 1: TREE PLANTING PALETTE

### Proposed New Tree Species



 *Carpinus betulus*

Common name: Hornbeam

We propose to plant 1 Hornbeam because:

- Native to UK
- Grows to be a large tree, so has the ability to create a welcoming focal point upon entry to Pembury Circus



 *Betula jaquemontii (clearstem)*

Common name: Himalayan Birch

We propose to plant 4 new birch trees because:

- To match the existing palette of birch trees already on site
- The row of birch trees along the western edge of Pembury Circus have more potential to provide privacy to residents inside the adjacent building. At the same time, birch trees are slender, so will not impact light entering windows.
- Fast-growing



 *Amelanchier lamarckii (multi*

Common name: Juneberry

We propose to plant two Juneberries because:

- Small tree appropriate to courtyard size
- White flowers in spring, red and purple fruits in autumn. Will brighten up the shady courtyard



 *Platanus acerifolia*

Common name: London Plane

We propose to plant two new Plane trees because:

- The existing three Plane trees on site are growing well and thriving
- To continue the row of plane trees along Dalston Lane, planted at a height of 7m to 'catch up' with the others
- Helps supplement the existing planting bed to frame the main entrance into Pembury Circus
